HPV-Positive Oropharyngeal Cancer

Common questions & answers about HPV-positive oropharyngeal squamous cell cancer (HPV-OSCC)

What is Human Papillomavirus (HPV)?

- HPV is a sexually transmitted infection that can infect the oropharynx (tonsils and throat), anus, and genitals.
- There are many types of HPV. HPV can cause cancer, warts or have no effect.
- Over two million Canadians have some type of genital or oral HPV infection.
- In some people, oral HPV infection leads to HPV-OSCC after many years.

What causes oropharyngeal cancer?

- HPV causes most oropharyngeal cancers in Canada.
- It is recommended that oropharyngeal tumors be tested for HPV.
- Smoking and alcohol use can also cause oropharyngeal cancer.

How did I get an oral HPV infection?

- HPV is transmitted to your mouth by oral sex. It may also be possible to get oral HPV by other ways.
- Performing oral sex and having many oral sex partners can increase your chances of oral HPV infection.
- Having an oral HPV infection does not mean your partner was/is unfaithful and does not suggest promiscuity.

When did I get this infection?

- We do not know the time from first oral HPV infection to cancer but it takes many years.
- We know that some people have infection 15 years or more before cancer.

What does having HPV in my tumor mean?

- Oropharyngeal cancer patients with HPV in their tumor live longer, on average, than people without HPV (i.e. HPV-positive tumors usually respond well to therapy).
- However, patients who currently smoke tobacco or have smoked for a long time in the past do not live as long as patients who never smoked. Patients who are current smokers should consider quitting.


Will the HPV vaccine help me?

- The HPV vaccine prevents people from getting new HPV infections.
- The vaccine will not help you clear an infection you already have.
- The vaccine is recommended for people ages nine to 26 years old.

Who has oral HPV infection?

- Many people will likely be exposed to oral HPV in their life.
- Around 10% of men and 3.6% of women in Canada have HPV in their mouths and HPV infection is more commonly found with elders.
- Most people clear the infections on their own within a year or two, but in some people HPV infection persists.

FACTS ABOUT ORAL CANCER




Oral Cancer is spreading. What was once considered an old man's disease is now crossing over into younger and younger generations. **HPV related cancers** are 6-7 times more common in men than women and is responsible for a **15x increase in oral cancer diagnosis**.

The advancements in imaging and implant surgery

Radiographic imaging is changing the way we see things. With the introduction of Cone Beam Computerized Tomography (CBCT) we can now visualize the mouth as a 3D model. It can aid with diagnosing pathology, bone morphology and identifying structures that we need to avoid during surgery.

CBCT offers many advantages over conventional CT scans:

- · reduction of the size of the irradiated area
- · higher image accuracy
- · reduction of image artifact
- · reduction in x-ray dose





plants. Using Computerized Tomography (CT) Scan techniques and 3-D imaging we can now visualize the placement of dental implants in three dimensions. Implant surgery can now be preplanned on the computer so that there are less surprises during the procedure by eliminating the guesswork involved in determining what parts of the jawbone offer the best sites for dental implant placement.

This revolutionary system offers more accurate and safer positioning of dental implants. This technology enables us to get an advanced, detailed look at the interior sections of the jaw bone, surrounding tissue and the nerves.
