Your dental insurance and the CDCP (Canadian Dental Care Plan) is just a benefit. It doesn't cover everything.



At our dental office, we are not insurance-driven — our focus is on you and your unique oral health needs. While we understand the importance of helping patients utilize their coverage, our treatment recommendations are always based on what is best for your long-term health, comfort, and smile. Insurance plans can vary and sometimes limit coverage, but we believe your care should never be limited by those boundaries. Our team will always explain your options clearly and help you make informed decisions that prioritize your well-being.

For example, most insurance plans will cover cavity checking x-rays (bitewings) every 9-12 months. We have many patients who are not cavity prone (have a low caries risk) and therefore, despite having the coverage for higher frequency, we only recommend bitewings once every 18-24 months.



On the other hand, some patients tend to build up a lot of plaque and calculus around their teeth and under their gums. This leads to bone loss, which leads to tooth loss. This is why our hygiene team takes gum measurements (periodontal probing) once a year to monitor progression of gum disease. Some patients need to come in every 3 months for scaling because they have more bone loss even though insurance may not cover that frequency. Some teeth that are heavily restored benefit from crowns to prevent cracks from forming. Our treatment coordinators send x-rays and intra oral photographs to your insurance to support the need for a crown. Some policies don't cover or partially cover these procedures but despite that our recommendation is always based on your long term health.



It's important for dental patients to understand their insurance coverage so they can make informed decisions about their oral health. Knowing what is and isn't covered helps avoid unexpected costs and allows patients to plan their treatment with confidence. However, because dental insurance can be complex, our team is always here to help. We'll gladly send pretreatment estimates to your insurance provider and review the details with you, so you have a clear understanding of any out-of-pocket expenses. Our goal is to make your dental care as transparent and stress-free as possible.

Sports Guards protect your teeth and can prevent concussions

Wearing a sports guard is essential for protecting your teeth, gums, and jaw during any athletic activity where contact or impact can occur. A properly fitted sports guard acts as a cushion, absorbing and distributing the force of blows that could otherwise cause broken teeth, lip and tongue injuries, or even jaw fractures. Beyond preventing dental emergencies, it can also reduce the risk of concussions by softening the impact to the jaw and skull. Whether you play hockey, lacrosse, basketball, or any other sport, a custom-fitted sports guard made by your dentist ensures maximum comfort, protection, and peace of mind—helping you focus on your performance without compromising your health.



How a crown can prevent a cracked tooth

What Is Cracked Tooth Syndrome?

Cracked Tooth Syndrome (CTS) refers to a situation where a tooth develops a small, often invisible crack that causes discomfort—especially when chewing or when the tooth is exposed to temperature changes. Unlike a fully broken tooth, the crack may not show up on X-rays, and symptoms can come and go, which makes CTS challenging to diagnose. These cracks typically occur in molars because they absorb the most chewing force, but any tooth can be affected.

Common Signs and Symptoms

- Sharp pain when biting or releasing pressure
- · Sensitivity to hot, cold, or sweet foods
- Discomfort localized to one tooth
- Difficulty pinpointing the pain
- Pain without visible damage

What Causes Cracked Tooth Syndrome?

- Bruxism (teeth grinding or clenching)
- Large fillings that weaken tooth structure
- Chewing hard foods (ice, nuts, hard candy)
- Trauma to the mouth
- Age-related wear





How a Crown Can Help

- 1. Reinforces weak tooth structure by distributing the force over the entire biting surface so pressure no longer concentrates in the cracked area. This prevents the crack from spreading deeper into the tooth.
- 2. Reduces pain and sensitivity by stabilizing the tooth and sealing exposed dentin, a crown often eliminates the sharp pain associated with chewing and temperature changes.
- 3. Prevents further damage so the crack does not extend into the pulp or root, preventing potential root canal or in severe cases, extraction.
- 4. Restores function and longevity allowing normal chewing without fear of further fracture.

Susan Brown was born and raised in Guelph. The city has always held a special place for her. A nurse by profession, she worked in many areas of health care from acute care, health education, administration and home health care.

Raised in a family where civic duty and public service were stressed, her volunteer activities reflected this belief. She was a founding member of the AIDS committee of Guelph and Wellington County which later morphed into ARCH. To that end, she created a fund in memory of her father, Dr. Charles Pinch, which supports the Guelph Humane Society. She served as the Grants committee chair for all of her term as well as executive positions including the role of chair. She remained a volunteer with the board until 2018 and continues to support its activities.

Susan worked in many areas of health care and 1996 she co-founded Robertson Brown Health Services and became sole owner in 2008. The company provided home health care services in nursing, PSW care and companion support.

After the sale of the company in 2014, Susan joined the Board of Guelph Wellington Women in Crisis and co – chaired the fundraising committee that hosted two successful galas. The Guelph Civic Museum Capital Campaign was another of her volunteer commitments. Presently she sits on the OAKTREE10 panel to determine the recipient of this year's grants.

In 2016, she was honored to receive the Women of Distinction Community Award as well as being a recipient of the Inspirational Women designation by the Chamber of Commerce.

During Covid, Susan was able to create a family legacy from the war letters of both her parents and paternal grandparents. This treasure trove of transcribed letters morphed into a book that highlights their trials and joys during war as well as a personal snapshot of life in the medical corps while serving overseas in WWII.
